

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Preface....

Our great social thinker and the father of Indian constitution, Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar somewhere mentioned that 'Education is the milk of Tigress and one who will have it, will surely raise voice and ask social justice to come out of the pathetic situation'. Education and particularly higher education is very essential to illuminate the lives of poverty-stricken people living in rural areas. In 2000 by keeping in view the need of the people of the region, our founder President, Honorable Late Dr. Vimaltai Mundada, established Vasundhara College, Ghatnandur Tq. Ambajogai, Dist. Beed. The basic goal of the Institution is to impart higher education to the society. Our vision is "Pursuit the Excellence through the Education". Since the very inception of this institute, we have been working in this direction. The Institution began its first unit Vasundhara College, Ghatnandur with the purpose of imparting qualitative and value based Higher Education to the entire people deprived from such formal education. Before 2000, no such unit of higher education existed within the territory of 15 kms. This is the only unit in Ghatnandur to impart higher education in traditional disciplines. Later on, the persistent demand on the part of the parents forced the management to begin science unit in 2009. This College is permanently affiliated to Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad. And it is included under 2(f) of UGC Act since 2012. The College has two acres of land having its own building. Presently more than six hundred and forty two students are pursuing their higher education in various disciplines.

Since the opening of the College, our attempts are towards attaining the excellence in education. This is the beginning and we are aware that we have to travel long to achieve it. We have made sincere efforts and honest retrospections while preparing this self-study Report. We have highlighted strengths and not ignored the weaknesses. The SSR is prepared as per the newly formed guidelines by NAAC. We believe that to get our College accredited by an esteemed and autonomous body like NAAC will be a matter of pride and privilege. This process will provide us an opportunity to highlight our strengths and overcome weaknesses, which will help us to travel in the direction of excellence.

It is our privilege to give brief history of our College. Kamdhenu Sevabhavi Sanstha's Vasundhara College is a Sixteen years old Institution. It was established in 2000. It offers three - year B.A. and B.Sc. programs.

It is a prime Educational Institution in Ghatnandur. The history of the region is subject to frequent changes .This region was ruled by the Nizam of Hyderabad up to 1948.The local language is Marathi and the rulers language was Urdu. As a result, we find a good tolerable blend of these languages in day to day

life of the people. In 1960, this region became a part of Maharashtra, a state of Marathi speaking people.

The Educational facilities were very poor before 2000. Before the year 2000 the aspiring students of the area used to go to Ambajogai and Parli Vaijnath for education as there was no senior College in Ghatnandur. The Railway lines reaching Parbhani on one side and Hyderabad on the other are the main links to Ghatnandur. This is the only place in Ambajogai taluka connected by Railway. Nearly 30 villages around Ghatnandur come under its command area.

The College was formally inaugurated by late Sau Vimaltai Mundada, the cabinet Minister of Maharashtra. Initially the College was started with one stream i.e. Arts with 91_Students and 09 faculty members.

The Motto of our College is "Education for Success". The College was established in rural area with the Vision of 'The pursuit of Excellence through Education'. The old premise consists of 08 small halls and some rooms which were in the place of Grampanchayat of Ghatnandur. In the phase of development, the strength and staff went on increasing and a new campus of nearly 2.09 acres was purchased where the College is located at present. The faculty of Arts was shifted to the new campus in 2009. Science stream was introduced in the year 2009-2010. The new building was inaugurated by Late Sau. Vimaltai Mundada, the Cabinet Minister of Maharashtra. Since the beginning, our College is well known for offering U.G. programs.

The Ghatnandur village is literally well known for its 'famous butter'. The village is located near the Balaghat plateaus (ranges). Local deity of the area is Lord Someshwar. The town has weekly market place under the reign of the Nizam of Hydrabad. After independence, it has lost its administrative position and remained isolated and undeveloped. Since there is railway and highway linkage, it remained isolated from rest of the Beed District. The village is 120 kms away from the district place. Usually the students used to stop their education after 12th Class because they had to go 18 kms away for higher education which was financially and practically impossible. Briefly the student's masses of the region were deprived of higher education before 2000. By taking this need in view our visionary founder president Late Dr. Vimaltai Mundada and Mr. Govindrao Deshmukh established Kamdhenu Sevabhavi Sanstha, Ghatnandur Dist Beed in 2000.

The Management began its first unit Vasundhara College at Ghatnandur in 2000. Before this no senior College existed in the village. The prime goal of the Institution is to make available the higher education for students. The motto of College is "Education for Success". In 2009 Management began science faculty. Initially the College was in the rented building in 2009; the Management purchased two acres of land and erected the adequate building. This year we have stepped in the 16th years of its existence. It gives me immense pleasure that the College is going to submit SSR in this year. The accreditation by NAAC will help us to enhance the quality of education and provide us opportunity to overcome certain weaknesses. I congratulate Principal Dr. Dalve A. Executive Summary

(Criteria wise Report)

Kamdhenu Sevabhavi Sanstha's Vasundhara College, Ghatnandur is situated in the lap of Balaghat Ranges. The College is established with the world wide vision and mission of catering facility of higher education to the students of this region. The region is generally inhabited by the nomadic tribes who were far from the higher education facility and were ignorant about the facilities of higher education and opportunities to be created with the help of higher education. Since its establishment the College has been providing quality education to such deprived people. It is the opportunity created for the inhabitants of this region.

We are trying to inculcate the values of education under the guidance of Hon. Shri Balasaheb Deshmukh, the President of Kamdhenu Sevabhavi Sanstha. We want to shape our students into liberal and responsible citizens. We are trying to mould our students as an integral part of our society. Most of the faculty members are involved in cultural and social activities.

As a result of Research Committee Eight teachers have obtained Ph.D. and Fifteen teachers M.Phil. Six teachers have registered their names for Ph.D. The College also runs Competitive Exam Preparation classes for the student. The College also offers Night Library service for the readers.

The automation of office has been completed and it is in use and the automation of library is to be done before the commencement of the academic year. Research publication by our faculty is satisfactory. Principal Dr. A.Y. Dalve has been recognized as a Research Guide by the Parent University. The library is enriched with 5191 books. The activities of NSS, Cultural and Sports units are remarkable. Many times, the department of Physical Education has organized Intercollegiate Fencing and Wrestling tournaments. Every year our College conducts various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities for students' all-round development.

The College annually organizes Open Art Festival. The College has provided separate departments to Humanities and Social Sciences. The strength of students increased near about 642 students, who are pursuing education in various disciplines.

The students are admitted in the College on first come first served basis. The College has NSS unit of 50 students. Students participate in various social related and extension activities like survey and rallies. Besides this, the departments of language, social sciences and sciences have started their

Departmental association publication of wall posters on various occasions in the College. The students also participate in youth festival, sports competition and extra-curricular activities at various levels.

The Core Values are -

(I) Contribution to National Development:

The Institution has its goals through which the College strives hard to contribute to National Development. Serving the cause of social justice, ensuring equity and increasing access to higher education are some of the means by which National Development can be strengthened. The role of NSS Unit, the Cultural Unit and the Sports Department has been significant for social service and nation building. The participation of the Volunteers in State and National Level Camps and events has enhanced the process of communal harmony and cultural exchange. The College has produced a number of students who have been extending their services to the nation. Some of the teachers and volunteers visit neighboring villages to help and spread the message of the Saint Gadge Baba *Gram Swatchhata Abhiyan* (Clean Village Drive). The College has also adopted a village Salunkwadi. The College organizes Blood Donation Camps and we provide blood to the poor and needy people of this region. The College provides various scholarships to economically / socially backward students/physically challenged students.

(II) Fostering Global Competencies:

To foster global competencies among the students, the College has provided excellent infrastructural facilities like Computer Lab and separate library reading room for Career Guidance and researchers. The College has provided broadband internet connection free of cost to students and staff. The College has introduced Computer Science course and it has immensely helped the students to come to the global level of this economically and educationally backward region.

(III) Inculcating a Value System among Students:

Besides imparting knowledge, a special care is taken to inculcate values among the students. This has become a healthy practice promoted by the College since its inception. Inculcation of value system has always been the chief goal of the College. In library and the College campus, we display sayings and proverbs worth emulating. The healthy practices we follow include total gender equality, girls' representation on Students Council. As part of extension activities, we arrange value based lectures to promote value education among the students. It has been our endeavor—that the students should develop the spirit of scientific temper to combat superstitions prevalent in the society.

(IV) Promoting the Use of Technology:

The College motivates students and staff to join various courses which teach computer literacy including use of internet. This type of encouragement is necessary in a rural set up like Ghatnandur where there is a lot of scope for computer literacy. The College has modernized its Computer Laboratory which is now well equipped with computers, software and internet connectivity. The College has broadband Internet connectivity. The office automation is partially completed. The College has its own website for networking and dissemination of information to all the stakeholders. The College uses projector for academic and administrative work as well as training work. The College has provided Wi-Fi technology.

(V) Quest for Excellence:

An Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) is formed in the academic year 2015-16 to sustain and enhance quality in education. Faculty-wise coordination committees monitor activities of their respective faculty. It is the responsibility of the coordination committee to go to various classes and obtain feedback on teachers from the students. This type of feedback helps teachers in many ways to improve the quality of their teaching. The Principal holds regular meetings with HOD's and other committees in order to get feedback from various departments and to discuss, plan and implement important issues in academic, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. At the College level, the Career Guidance and Placement Cell conduct competitive tests on the basis of competitive examinations. Our Principal is the Member of Board of Studies in History subject of the Parent University. The College Motto is: *Education for Success* which is followed by the College honestly. Annually the College organizes Open Art Festival. A prize called as Yashwant Puraskar is given to the speaker who can put forth his/her views forcefully. This type of activity has certainly helped us to improve our overall performance. The College has received Rural Best Team Award.

I. Curricular Aspect

The vision of the College is to pursuit excellence through education for all round development of students to make them capable to touch the new horizons of knowledge and employment for their better future, as well as to make them responsible citizens for the service of community. Since the College has to follow university syllabus, we do not design courses or syllabus. Some of our staff members are the members of Board of Studies in Parent University. The Principal achieves the stated objectives of the curriculum from inspection in regular meetings. Industrial tours/historical/geographical and biological visits are arranged for knowledge to the students. The Institution has clearly set and defined

mechanism of obtaining feedback from students, parents and alumni to improve the performance and quality of the Institutional provisions. The exit level feedback from graduates' regarding learning process is collected and it is used to improve the overall competence of students.

Our College encourages most of the faculty members to participate in the workshop on the curriculum designing by sanctioning duty leave. Also to enhance the knowledge of the faculty members in their subjects the College gives permission to the faculty members for attending/ presenting research papers in symposium / seminar/ conference / orientation / refresher courses etc.

There has been a significant quantitative and qualitative progress in the area of curriculum development in the last five years. In the last five years the College has introduced two UG programs. In the last five years twelve members represented various authorities/ bodies of the university. The IQAC committee provides guidelines for the academic excellence, inculcation of character, value education and social concern, and the eradication of superstition. Project work is a part of the curriculum activity at the U.G. level.

II. Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Admissions to the under graduate B.A. and B. Sc. courses are done as per the rules and regulations laid down by Parent University. The College has constituted an admission committee comprising of senior teachers. The Admission Committee selects eligible students on the first come first admitted basis. Counseling is provided to the students by counseling cell if needed. The Institution has mechanism to review the admission process and student profile annually. The Admission Committee collects detail information about the students that helps office for processing further data. The co-education exists in the College and it aims at imparting holistic education with sufficient weight-age to ethical and moral principles.

Similarly career courses develop employable skills among the students to enhance the teaching learning process, advanced teaching aids like L.C.D. Projector. Faculty members participate in conferences, seminars, the workshops, refresher courses and orientation programmes to update their knowledge and skills. The Principal and IQAC monitor the teaching learning process of the College. Evaluation process is actually carried out by the parent university. However, to enhance the performance of students, Institution conducts seminars, group discussions and ppt presentation etc.

III. Research Consultancy and Extension

To promote research culture among the faculties and students the Research Committee has been established as per university guidelines. Eight faculties have received Ph.D. and applied for recognition as Ph. D. supervisor of Parent University. Under the guidance of the Principal Dr. Dalve A. Y. (History) One student has completed M.Phil. He is the recognized Ph. D. guide of Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad where eight students are registered for Ph.D. Six faculties are pursuing for Ph.D. work. Most of the faculties from the College attended and presented papers in University, State, National and International Conferences, Seminars and the Workshops.

The NSS department of the College is active in rendering extension services. Students are participating in awareness rallies on issues like female foeticide, Global warming, save environment, flood relief fund rallies, Aids Rallies etc. The Dr, Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad organized Youth Festival at Ambajogai. In 'Youth Festival-2012' College has got first position in mimicry event. In 'Youth Festival-2013' held at Aurangabad College has got third position in *Powada* (Ballad). In 'Youth Festival- 2014', held at Aurangabad the College has received first prize in classical dance. The College received three prizes in Poem Recitation, *Pakhawaz* and Creative Dance; the College has got third position in these events. In 'Youth Festival-2015' held at Aurangabad the College has got third position in Classical dance, Poem Recitation and folk dance *Lavani*. The College has received NSS best Volunteer Award in Special Camp held at Aurangabad in 2010-11.

IV. Infrastructure and Learning Resources

In order to create and enhance the infrastructure facilities for effective teaching and learning, the policy is framed according to the strength of students in different streams. The policy also confirms the strength as per the lecturer appointed for the Institution. The College is endowed with physical infrastructure facility to support the teaching learning process. The main campus is spread over 2.09 acres of land. Master plan has been prepared for the campus. Our College has spacious auditorium, adequate number of classrooms and well equipped laboratories. The College has established well equipped computer laboratory with 30 computers. The faculties of the College are given access to internet so that they can enrich their knowledge and foster research activities.

The outdoor/indoor games facilities like Table tennis, Chess, Carom, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Athletics, Volley ball etc. are provided to the students in the College campus. The College has one NSS unit of 50 students. The College has been regularly participating in Pulse Polio eradication campaign, Blood Donation

etc. The College provides filtered RO water, which has a very special concern for the health and hygiene of the College students. The Institution ensures infrastructural facilities for physically challenged students. The College also provides recreation facilities through programmes like gathering and other cultural and extension activities. The College has a good Library and fulfills adequate requirements of the students. The Library Advisory Committee discusses and finalizes academic requirements. The Institution has developed Library with automation. In the forthcoming years, the College will to strive hard for making Library rich and update.

V. Student support and progression

The Institution publishes its prospectus annually. It provides all the necessary information regarding the admission procedure, eligibility criteria, scholarships, faculties, awards, optional subjects, various committees and activities to be engaged during the year. The College prospectus provides complete profile of the College. Institution provides scholarships free ships to the students as per the rules and regulations of Govt. of India and Govt. of Maharashtra. open merit scholarship is given to the general category. The College caters to the academic need of the students belonging to the masses. Majority of students who belong to the non creamy layer of the society are from weaker sections of the society. The College has arranged marriage ceremony for the poor and the needy students. Instead of giving prizes in cash, we distribute prizes in the form of books. These prizes are given to students for their curricular and extra-curricular achievements. Every year our College conducts Inter-University Debate, Summer Couching Camp and Open Art festival. We display each and every advertisement regarding competitive exams and job vacancies on the notice board as well as whatsapp and facebook. We also conduct M.P.S.C., U.P.S.C. and other competitive exam Classes without any charge for the students of the College and the surrounding area. Our College runs the night library service for the readers without charging anything. Excellence of Vasundhara Award is given every year in the activities like cultural, NSS, Sports, etc.

There is reservation for students belonging to differently- able category, the College motivates the students to take part in state and national level competitive examinations. The College also invites guest lecturers to guide the students for career guidance. The students get guidance and take benefit of it in selection of employment. Grievance Redressal Cell actively interacts with the students to help them sort out their grievances. Similarly Anti Ragging Committee, Sexual Harassment and Women's Cell are constituted to take all necessary measures to ensure the safety and dignity of female students. The question bank helps the

students to overcome their problems and ultimately helps them to progress towards higher level of education and employment.

VI. Governance, Leadership and Management

The Vision and Mission of the Institution are achieved through various activities of the College. Decentralization of power through different committees has enhanced quality in the Institution. An active Management is always encouraging the faculties, students in all academic and administrative ventures. The College observes complete transparency in the admission process and recruitment of the faculty. The office is computerized. The Principal of the College has freedom in planning and implementation of the academic matters. The Committees have freedom to plan and execute the programs and activities in the campus. Feedbacks from the stakeholders are analyzed and implemented.

The Management always encourages the participation of the staff in the process of decision making in Institutional functions. The Principal of the Institution has the authority to govern the Institution according to the rules and regulations of Governing Body, State Govt., UGC as well as the Parent University.

The Management of the College is in constant touch with the Principal of the Institution and has amicable support. The Principal keeps an eye on the performance of faculty through PBAS (Performance Based Appraisal System). Welfare schemes and facilities are available for faculty members. IQAC is effective in planning, maintaining, implementation and improvement of the Institution. IQAC advises to the extension activities and plans, put forth by various departments and also keeps in touch with other departments.

VII. Innovation and best practices

The Institution is taking necessary step to ensure a clean and healthy environment that aids effective learning and teaching. We protect and preserve the campus with keen observation the classrooms are naturally well lit that they hardly need artificial lighting. The College has installed CFL's at the main places. We provide waste water to the plants and trees. To conserve the electricity the supply is switched off/unplugged for fans, lights, computers, printers and electrical equipments when not in use.

Plantation of trees is undertaken by the NSS department on the various occasions involving the guests and chief guests to plant the trees in the campus. There are 600 trees of different varieties e.g. Fruits - Mango, Neem, Papaya, Guava etc. The planted trees in the campus are kept in growing condition and provided with the necessary water using the water harvesting project in the College and in summer these trees are fed using waste water from nearby water purifying plant. The College has already begun a nursery of different saplings. More stress is laid

on the long- term measures than the short term ones. Environment awareness is being created among the students and people for judicious usage of water. The harvested water and waste water from the water purifying plant is used by the College through pipeline to each and every plant in order to conserve various plants and trees to make the campus green and healthy.

The College has the system to dispel garbage in the College campus. The leaves and small cheats of paper are put in the tank and used for plants and trees as fertilizer. The Institution has taken steps to establish a bio project to recycle the waste material and scrap in the campus. The recycled material is used as the fertilizer to the trees and plants in the College campus.

The Institution has established *Yashwant Pratishthan* to felicitate the successful candidates in the various fields. *Yashwant Pratishthan* is an aspiring of Kamdhenu Sevabhavi Sanstha, Ghatnandur. Through this platform the College selects and felicitates the outstanding students, schools and people for their contribution to the society. This has positively helped to create healthy bound between the College and Society.

The College has made the Library fully opened for the students, learners and research scholars. The students have the facility of internet web browsing in the library. The College can control the violent behavior, misbehavior, sexual harassments, etc. in the classrooms and College campus with the help of various committees. The College has provided Wi-Fi technology.

The best practices in the Institution have promoted the process of developing and maintaining quality in both academic and administrative systems. The Institution has internalized the best practices in order to improve the functioning with students' participation for the quality of education. The administration in the Institution is maintained by the active participation of staff at every level.

Summer Sports Coaching Camp is the best practice. The sports discipline and health committee motivates students to participate in the summer coaching camp. Earlier, in the Physical department there was no motivation, awareness, interest, internal and external skills and was not the leadership developed among the students. The students are also motivated to participate in various sports activities arranged by our College and University.

Apart from this two participated students of the College benefitted from this summer camp. In spite of this, the students from our College are motivated to

participate in the inter-collegiate, inter university, state, national and international level games.

Our twenty one students are selected for the university level. In the Academic Year 2011-12 with the help of Physical Education Department the nearby school's one student was selected for National Level in fencing which was held at Nashik. In the Academic Year 2012-13, three students were selected for the university level competition they were Mr. Sharad Sarawade, Miss. Sunita Chate, and Miss. Shaikh Ajmin Jaffar. In the Academic Year 2013-14 one student of the College is selected as a constable at S. P. Office, Wardha. Apart from this, so many students are benefitted from this camp.

In the Academic Year 2013-14 eighty five students had participated and benefitted. In the Academic Year 2013-14, Mr. Piraji Kusale, Miss. Ayodhya Daund, Miss. Radha Bhosale had participated in the various events. In the academic year 2014-15 One hundred and forty students have participated and benefitted out of them fifty were girls and ninety boys. In the Academic Year 2014-15 two students participated in Inter University level games held at Patiyala. (Mr. Piraji Kusale and Miss. Priyanka Misal) In the Academic Year 2014-15 50 girls and 90 boys were participated in the Summer Camp. In the Academic Year 2015-16 86 girls and 156 boys were participated in the Summer Camp.

In order to make the students active in sports as well as in the walks of life, this camp is promoted. Students are very prominent in sports activities. The succeeded students are being displayed on the notice boards for the notice of the students and stakeholders. So that they could actively participate in such activities, this is for creating the curiosity to participate in the sports activities. The Summer Camp is being organized for last four years. This camp provides opportunity to develop students as players, well nourished human beings and gain physical and mental fitness.

Open Art Festival is the second best practice of the College. The College informs the nearby schools and institutes to participate in this festival by sending special letters and an annual gathering invitation cards. The wide publicity is given in the daily newspaper and by whatsapp and facebook. Earlier, there was no open stage, no encouragement to develop their essential skills. Evaluation is not taken from artistic point of view. The prime concern of Festival is that to maintain cultural heritage of the Maharashtra.

Through this Festival we are able to provide the open stage to the stakeholders. The College has made an effort to succeed in this Festival. We appoint examiners for the Open Art Festival. All the expenses are borne by the College's *Yashwant Pratishthan*, the expenses include prize amount awarded to

the winners and participants. The Committee maintains the required applications. In the Academic Year 2012-13 nineteen students participated in the Festival. In 2013-14 eleven students participated and in 2014-15 eighteen students participated in the Festival

Students are able to participate in various activities and programs at university level and national level. We are creating cultural atmosphere in this area. Above all, our Institution getting involved in this Festival got fruitful results from the Open Stage Festival. The participated students are very successively passed in their respective arts with good efforts.

Apart from this the College has organized marriage ceremony for the poor and needy people for last three years.

SWOC Analysis:

Our College is the Sixteen years old Educational Institution established in 2000 with the pure motif of educating all the sections of masses. The College has established science faculty in 2009 in this area. Our College aims to impart education to poor and needy students. We have been struggling hard to achieve just academic and society uplifting objectives. We are proud to say that our College fulfills all the expected potential. Our College is situated in the undeveloped region of Marathwada. It caters to the needs of all sections of communities by offering arts and science courses. Our present infrastructure is inadequate so we need to strengthen it. We have sufficient class-rooms to engage the classes. Our College building was built in 2009 which needs up gradation.

Our College campus is spread over area of 2.09 acres. There is no separate academic building but there are small sections. Library and Canteen are available in the campus. We have planned to beautify our campus making gardens by harvesting waste water from water plant. Our Library is needed to be upgraded with books, journals, periodicals and news papers and to be well maintained to make it user friendly. We wish to improve the existing Library facilities and also wish to upgrade by making Library automation services.

The teaching faculty is well qualified having NET/SET, Ph.D. and M.Phil. Degrees. Our College campus is natural and developed by core team of the College. We have healthy relations with all stakeholders through community based extension activities. The Institution caters the needs of socially backward and educationally weaker sections of the community. There is beneficial atmosphere for teaching and learning. The Institution has prominent participation in sports, cultural and NSS activities at various levels. The College campus is Eco-Friendly

and helps in multi-organization of extra- curricular, extension and co-curricular activities.

Weaknesses

The Institute has inadequate qualified teachers and staff with NET, SET, Ph.D. and M.Phil for the self financing courses. The consultancy services are not formalized by the College. Innovative ICT enabled teaching practices are inadequate. Less financial sources are available in the College. Lack of digitalization, scanning of Library and there is need of up gradation in Library services. Our College is not covered under section 12(b) of the UGC Act. So, we are not able to organize International, National and State level seminars, Conferences and the workshops. There is lack of departmental Library and Laboratory. There is no research center of the Parent University in the College. Our College is located in Balaghat hilly ranges. There are a large number of BPL families with Low literacy rate of higher education. There is lack of industry and less willingness among the women for the higher education; less welfare schemes for students. The qualified teachers are not ready to serve in the science faculty because this faculty is permanently on the Non-Grant Basis.

Opportunities

We have opportunity to develop the campus and garden; find out slow learners and advanced learners to coach them properly. We have opportunity in monitoring human values among the students. There is opportunity to reflect leadership among the students and staff, development of student centric plan of teaching and learning. We have opportunity to motivate staff and student for research activities. We have been providing platform for artistic personnel and all rounder. Empowering women through education, progression and opportunity of higher education is to be developed in the minds of students. We have opportunity to strengthen the infrastructure of library facilities. There is opportunity to support underprivileged students by enhancing their academic and job skills. We are catering the higher education in the rural area so we have opportunity to serve the people deprived of higher education and creating healthy capable and creative human beings as well as in building the healthy nation.

Challenges

There is a challenge for us to mould and fold the rural and farming section students. There is not educational background in the family of the students. A majority of students are failed in the X^{th} , XII^{th} standards. Our College is located in the region like Marathi speaking people. It is challenge for us how to develop them.

To face the global needs and life needs of the day. To make the students responsible citizen of the country, Inadequate student welfare measures, low income of the people, sugarcane labors, hilly region, low literacy rate, lack of industry and employment opportunities, lack of willingness among the women about the higher education. There is no facility of PG and Distance Education. Research recognized center is not available in the College and the Fixed services to downtrodden and Nomadic Tribes with the help of equity initiatives. The competence to face the new challenges of the world, the fulfillment of vision, mission and objectives with the specific proposed practices having been observed the students level in curricular, co-curricular extension and extra-curricular activities. We are trying to bring them to the average level of the class and community. We are facing the obstacles to collect the necessary stuff from all the stakeholders for the Institutional development and the progress.

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision and mission of the Institution, and how it is communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders?

Kamdhenu Sevabhavi Sanstha, Ghatnandur runs this College. The following are the Vision, Mission and objectives of the Institution.

- 4. Establishing continuous intellectual activity and co-response to change.

- 1. To cultivate good habits and discipline among the students.
- 2. To create thirst for knowledge.
- 3. To motivate students for their continuous personal and professional growth.
- 4. To encourage the students for higher education.
- 5. To make the students competent in all the walks of life.
- 6. To implement national values given in the constitution of India to the possible extent.

All the activities of the College are planned and executed keeping in view the missions and objectives. The College has conducted various activities to raise awareness among the students regarding the social, political, economic and environmental realities of contemporary India.

The vision and mission statement is communicated to stakeholders through Management–Teacher Meeting, Principal-Students Meeting, Alumni Association Meeting, and Principal–Parent Meeting and various activities arranged. These statements are displayed in the College campus, stated in the College Prospectus and uploaded on the website.

1.1.2 How does the Institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The College effectively implements the curriculum designed by the affiliated university. The teachers prepare a teaching plan (Annual Plan) for the whole academic year in consult with the Principal and University directives. Syllabus is finished within the stipulated time. The syllabus is determined by the affiliating university for every semester and teachers divide the syllabus in order to simplify it for students. The syllabus is divided in two semesters which is determined from July to November and January to May. Another method of implementation of the curriculum is that new books related to the latest syllabus are specifically added every year in the Library stock and the students are informed and instructed to go through these latest books. The arrangement of meeting is held for the said purpose. During the teaching sessions, the students are taught and prepared for the University semester exams as per the Schedule prescribed by the university.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or Institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The university supports the College teachers by making them faculty members through nomination. These nominated members attend the faculty

meetings, at the university and there they discuss the problems related to the syllabus with the authorities to work out the solutions. To improve the teaching practices, the university organizing 'Orientation/ Refresher courses and faculty Improvement Programs. The teachers participate in these programs as per UGC and the University norms.

To deliver and transit curriculum effectively, the students are taught as per the syllabus designed by the parent university. The modern teaching aids, like Charts, PPT etc. are used to deliver the contents of the syllabus effectively. The lectures have been allotted as per university recommendations for teaching.

For the effective implementation of the curriculum; designed by the university; the faculty members use to involve the students in co-curricular activities and ask them to get active participation in the curriculum related activities. The co-curricular activities such as participation in field tours, different study visits, cultural activities etc. are arranged for the students.

Our teachers keep an eye over the requirements of the industries, such as software industries. Through the interactions our teachers come to know about the latest trends. Keeping in mind the suggestions of the beneficiaries, the prescribed curriculum of the university is operated in the classes with latest updates. There is little scope for industry in the surrounding area. The majority of the people related to the farming section. The guest lecture is arranged for the said purpose.

Being the university nominated faculty members, the teachers of our College have contributed a lot in the development of the curriculum prescribed by the university. Our Principal has attended the faculty meetings in the university and gave suggestions about designing the curriculum. He has also represented the

College in the Board of Studies. Four faculty members of the College have worked as the members of the syllabus designing committee of the parent University. Four faculty members of the College also have worked as the members of the paper setting committee of the parent university. The Faculties in College discuss with the BOS members of the concerned subjects and suggest changes in the syllabus. All stakeholders are undertaken at the time of syllabus designing. The suggestions of staff, students and stakeholders about up gradation in the curriculum are conveyed to the university through BOS members and other higher authorities.

Curriculum of the course is need based and job oriented. Computer Science course generates human resource in hardware and software industry. The Environmental Science is the mandatory subject for the second year students. Fee structure is decided by the university, but the College gives fee concession to the wards of the economically weaker sections. Our College also takes the fees in installments.

The College follows the rules and regulations of the parent university as far as teacher-qualification is concerned.

1.2.5 Does the College provide additional skill oriented programs relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programs and the beneficiaries.

The College regularly conducts personality development programs which enhance the IQ level, communication skills of the stakeholders. The College students give visit to the industry apart from the above all; our NSS. department is

very active. Through various activities of the NSS department our students get stage courage, leadership qualities, community service etc. Similarly the Career Counseling and Guidance Cell invite the renowned guests who create enthusiasm and zeal among the students about the competitive examinations. These programs are always energy creating among the students. Nonetheless, the departments of Languages, Social Sciences, and Science have formed the study associations of their departments and they invite the scholars from the various subjects for the inauguration and guidance. This activity is the most useful to the stakeholders. In such programs of the departments, our students publish scholarly and studied wallpapers prepared by them and guided by our department faculties. We also celebrate various renowned leaders', thinkers' and writers' birth and death anniversaries with the publication of the wallpapers on the contributions of the personalities. Research Committee inspires students to do the research by making various projects. The Research Committee sends the College teams to the various research activities.

1.2.6 Does the university provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face to face and Distance mode of education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice." If 'yes', how does the Institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

In our Institution there is no such flexibility.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the Institution to supplement the University's

Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

The Institution as per its goals and objectives seeks the overall development of students through various extension activities organized by the College.

These activities are awareness about the environment, developing gender equality through programs like *Jagar Janivancha*, inculcation of moral and ethical values by organizing lectures on death and birth anniversaries of national leaders and **Seven Days Summer Coaching Camp** is organized for the development of the students. **Open Art Festival and Debate Competition** is organized in the college every year. The University curriculum is followed regularly. The academic calendar of the College is prepared yearly and followed

accordingly. The Principal ensures that the curriculum of the University is supplemented in such a way that reflects the mission and the vision of the Institution. Timely meetings are arranged by the management of the Institution to have the feedback about the various programs organized by the College.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the Institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

Sincere efforts are made by the Institution to modify and enrich the curriculum to suit the needs of the students in all the walks of the life by the involvement of faculty and other stakeholders. The Principal of the College who is on the member of board of studies of the university takes active part in curriculum enrichment of the University. The College has introduced Environment Science and Computer Science as per the guidelines laid by the parent university. These subjects cater to the regional and global needs of the students.

The College runs competitive exam classes for the students without charging any fees; so that they could be prepared for various competitive exams.

In the same way, we provide computer facilities in Library and Laboratories. Internet facility is available to the students. Computers, LCD projectors have been used for effective communication and teaching. The Wi-Fi facility is also provided for the students and staff; the whole campus is Wi-Fi enabled. Using this facility in the campus the students can easily get to concerned sites and can get information about the vacancies in the market.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the Institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

To integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc. the Institution has followed the footprints of the parent university by introducing various programs and respective subjects. Through *Jagar Janivancha* program the Institution tries to maintain gender equality. The Institution gives opportunity to female employees to work as the chief of the various committees. The staff secretary of the College is Mrs. Dr. Kotule Bayja Mahadev. She is also made the in-charge of the Women's Redressal Cell (WISHAKHA).

The faculty of Geography department creates awareness about the climate change. Environment Science is the compulsory subject in our College. The students along with the teachers go on geographical tours. As far as ICT is concerned our College has introduced Computer Science as a compulsory subject and optional subject at UG level. Computer Lab facility is provided for the students.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programs offered to ensure holistic development of students?

Moral and Ethical Values:

NSS wing of the College engages the students in community development activities which motivates the students to take up the courses of social services. The Colleges' NSS team regularly visits surrounding areas and villages where people are provided awareness on various social, moral, ethical principles and way of life. The students are also motivated by way of special lecturers so as to instill moral and ethical values in them.

Employable and life skills:

The College is aware that the need of communication skill is vital for the students for better career options. Therefore, the College arranges group discussions, essay-writing competitions, and hand-writing workshops at regular intervals in regional and English language. The Students are also allotted different responsibilities in organizing various events and activities, such as cultural programs /competitions etc. In this way they improve their team building and organization skills. The Women's Grievance Cell provides the knowledge/tips to develop various skills useful for their future life to girl students.

Better Career Options:

The College provides computers to the students to develop their skill of basic computer operating principles which includes basic computer operation, MS Office, Internet operation. The college organizes Seven Days Summer Camp to develop the all rounded personalities.

Community Orientation:

For community orientation the College provides personality development programs, debate competition and computer coaching classes. The Colleges' NSS team regularly visits surrounding area and the nearby villages, where people are provided awareness on various social, moral principle and ways of life.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The Institution has various channels to collect documents, responses on curriculum from the stakeholders. The Principal, being the head of the Institution is responsible for collecting feedback from the stakeholders through meetings. The Principal's office will then process and submit the analysis report and present it to the College Management Committee. The Principal reviews the analysis reports and initiates interventions. After collection of these feedback forms from the students, the Principal conveys the strong points and lacunas from the teaching skills with the help of the letters. After getting the suggestions from the Principal, our teachers make improvements in their teaching style as well as increase the understanding of the students with the use of ICT etc.

1.3.6 How does the Institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The Institution has a very clear and transparent way to monitor and evaluate the quality of various enrichment programmes initiated by it. The feedback in the form of interactions, discussions and suggestions is analyzed by the Constituted Committee and report is submitted to the Head of the Department. An advisory Committee meets with the higher authority like Principal and the Management Committee from time to time and amends the enrichment programmes to meet the desired objective. The Institution makes sure that the programmes offered in the curriculum include contribution to national development. In the same way the College uses education as the tool for empowering women and through the transaction of the curriculum it has adopted, it seeks to address the all round development of the students enrolled in the various academic programs. The College also runs the *Jagar Janivancha Abhiyan* by which the students are aware about the protection of female gender with the gender awareness. The Institution evaluates the quality of its enrichment programme with the help of various Constituted Committees for the said purpose.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the Institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The Institution is affiliated to Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad and therefore, there is no scope for framing Institution's curriculum on its own. We have to follow University Syllabus. Since, systematic

mechanism is installed in the Institution to look after the affairs of the feedback process and analysis through the member of Board of Studies. Some of our staff members are on the Board of Studies of University. They give suggestions about the syllabus in the meetings. Heads of Departments of our College, informally meet the member of Board of Studies and HOD's of other College to discuss the changes in curriculum. Faculty members regularly attend workshops and seminars arranged by the University or the other Institution regarding design and development of curriculum.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programs?

Yes, the Principal have recognized the fact that true evaluation of its academic programs can be properly done through feedback mechanism. For the Faculty-wise Coordination Committee Members and Principal interact with students about suitability, difficulty level of the curriculum. Students' suggestions are noted down and they are communicated to respective BOS through our teachers. Our alumni also give us feedback on curriculum, informally, in their annual meet.

In the Parent-Teacher Association, parents give their suggestions regarding the usefulness of the course contents. The College regularly organizes lectures in which eminent speakers are invited to deliver lectures on various topics. These speakers also express their opinions about the curriculum of the university.

The Institution takes part in the curriculum development process through appropriate analysis of feedback given by the various faculties but yet not the stakeholders of the College. Our BOS member Dr. Dalve A. Y. actively participates in the formation of the curriculum of the Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad in the subject of History. Feedback from different stakeholders is discussed informally and formally in the faculty meetings and the teachers convey their suggestions and ideas to the concerned bodies of the parent university to appropriate action. Our faculty members participate in different kinds of workshops organized by the parent university and the affiliated Colleges.

1.4.3 How many new programs / courses were introduced by the Institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programs?) Any other relevant information regarding curricular aspects which the College would like to include.

Taking into consideration the rural students demand and to develop scientific temper in the student's mind the College started Science faculty in 2009-10. Before this there was only Arts faculty in our College. Similarly Science faculty was not available in Ghatnandur town. The students used to go at Ambajogai for seeking admissions in Science faculty therefore, Institution started the science faculty. In the year 2014-15 we also started Commerce faculty.

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the College ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

Publicity in the admission process

- Before the commencement of the new academic session the prospectus is made available to the students. All relevant information regarding the admission procedure, infrastructure, fee and scholarships, various activities of the College, achievements of the students in academic as well as sports and other extension activities are conveyed through the prospectus.
- The College has its own website from where students can gather information regarding the College. E-mail queries, if any, are responded promptly.
- During all important functions the Principal transmits the same information to the audience.
- Huge Billboards are fixed at strategic points on the campus boundary; walls of the College building also serve the purpose.
- The teams of teachers personally visit schools in the neighboring areas to publicize the achievements, infrastructure, courses available and the related facts of the College.

• Transparency in the Admission Process

- To ensure transparency in the Admission Process for all the courses, applications are invited in advance. Admission to every course is conducted under the supervision of Admission Committees constituted for the said purpose.
- The Career Counseling Cell is always there for the help of the candidates. Admission registers of all the classes are prepared where details such as, the student's name, father's name, period-wise allotment of timetable, section, passing percentage, remarks of the students etc.
- This record is available to any candidate to scrutinize in the office.

Depending on the types of courses, the following criteria and process of admissions are adopted:

- Students for general courses like B.A. are selected on merit cum first-come first- served basis depending upon the number of seats available especially in Arts and Science Faculties.
- The Counseling Cell of the College guides the aspirants for appropriate courses to make their choice according to their aptitude and ability.
- The numbers of seats for Regular courses are limited so; the College has to depend on merit cum first-come-first-serve policy.

The prospectus of the college gives entire information about the process of admission and extension activities of the college.

- Establishment of Student Welfare Fund

Slow learners

- Peer learning is provided.
- They are guided to take coaching from specialists in the field.
- Simplified versions of books are recommended to them.
- Teachers resort to regional languages (Hindi and Marathi) so that such students understand the gist of their lecture.
- Additional notes and set of question papers of previous exam.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the College plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc)

Academic calendar

Academic calendar is released by Parent University and is to be followed in totality by needed requirements of the College. The same calendar is published in the College prospectus, website, facebook account and whatsapp before the beginning of the academic year.

Teaching plan

- Every teacher draws his/her teaching plan, broadly taking into consideration, the ability of students. These plans are reviewed and rechecked, if needed.
- The academic calendar and individual teaching plans are meant for broad reference.
- The teachers also hold extra classes during the off period.
- If necessary, extra classes are taken.

Evaluation Blue print

- Oral and written class tests are scheduled at the end of the terms.
- Class tests are taken internally before the final examination conducted by the university.
- The combined score is considered for eligibility for the final university exams and the highest scorer and the second highest scorer (subject wise) are awarded prizes by the College as an incentive to study hard.
- Co-Curricular and Extra Curricular activities are evaluated on special days.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

IQAC contribute to improve the teaching – learning process by:

IQAC identifies needs of training of the teachers and schedules the programme of training courses. At the advice of IQAC teachers are deputed to attend these programmes. IQAC also encourages the teachers to have discussions among the teachers. Feedback from the students is sought on the teaching performance of the teachers; thereafter those teachers are advised accordingly.

Teachers are also encouraged by IQAC to attend the conferences, seminars, workshops held in their respective subjects to upgrade their subject knowledge. The performance of the students is analyzed in the IQAC. Students are categorized as per their performance into weak learners, slow learners and advanced learners. The special classes are organized accordingly need of the students.

At Vasundhara College, Ghatnandur, students have always been the centre of its entire academic and co academic activities. All possible efforts are made to ensure their fullest growth and development in a safe and congenial environment. Right from the beginning student enters the portals of the College, he/she is guided, inspired, motivated, corrected and their energies channelized in the best possible manner.

At B.A. Final Year students are assigned a Project Work for collection of data, analyse and present it. The Project Work has worked well in the direction of independent learning. Admission Committee, Career Counseling and Guidance Cell, Remedial classes, concessions, aids, awards, incentives, special classes for them for the global job market as well as national market as morally upright, socially responsible, and professionally sound human resource. The support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, and independent learning among the students are audio-visual aids, projector and computer-based teaching-learning method, library, laboratories and reading rooms.

2.3.4 How does the Institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

- The College provides open access to educational and life-long learning opportunities by inculcating healthy habits like, discipline, leadership, entrepreneurship. There by contributing to the social, cultural, and economic development of our region.
- Lifelong learning is ensured with the help of giving the duties during the function organized by clubs, societies, arrangement of events like trade fair every year.
- The College offers programs and extensive career education, and basic skills education and adequate infrastructure where students are provided opportunities to practice and improve critical thinking, effective communication, quantitative reasoning, information competency, community and global awareness, self-efficacy and workplace skills.
- Students are assigned with various creative tasks such as report-writing, press release, recording, questioning resource persons during seminars etc.
- The College arranges awareness programmes like women literacy, antidowry, environmental, health, save water, spiritual, yoga, disaster management social eradication, birth and death anniversary etc.
- College organized guest lecture on superstition awaken by *VIVEK WAHINI*.
- Every year the College organized debates competition.
- Every year the College organized seven days Summer Couching Camp.
- The College arranges guest lectures.
- The College arranges academic discourses, sports and cultural activities.
- Every year the College organized Open Art Festival
- The College Library subscribes to newspapers, journals and magazines.
- The advertisement of the vacancies of the various competitive exams and other jobs are displayed on the notice board of the Library time to time.
- The College Library opened at night from at.7.00 to 10.00 p.m.
- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? - Some of the departments like History, Economics and Geography etc. organize industrial, historical visits and to acquaint the students with the changes taking place in their stream.
- Faculties are motivated and encouraged to attend the seminars and workshops etc.
- The College Library has subscribed to various journals related to different subjects. In addition to this books and magazines are purchased by the College on the regular basis for knowledge up gradation.
- Keeping in mind the advancements in information technology, the College
 has moved ahead of its peers by using computers and internet to teach most
 of the subjects. The College students are encouraged to use these facilities
 and for that purpose a Computer Lab has also been established in the
 College.

- A separate periodical section has been created in the Library.
- Paper cutting file kept in the Library.
- E-Sources are available in the Library.
- A separate visiting register maintained by library.
- Old question papers of final exams in all the subjects are made available to the students.
- Copies of syllabi prescribed by the university and question-wise division of marks are also available to students for ready reference.
- Library is opened even during the night also for the Study At.7.00 to 10.00 p.m.
- The Library staff keeps the faculty and the students updated regarding its latest acquisitions.
- The new arrival titles are displayed on the display boards at the entrance of the Library.

2.3.10 Does the Institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the Institutional approaches to overcome these.

The Institution encourages students to participate in co-curricular and extracurricular activities so; the College faces a challenge in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar. Lengthy schedule of exams created hurdle to the students and faculty training, strikes, banns also created problems to complete the time frame and calendar. However, the College takes special classes of such students during the off periods. The Institution faces problem in the case of slow learners due to that reason we take the Special Classes for them.

The quality of teaching-learning is evaluated on the basis of results of tests and final exams. To improve the quality of teaching the teachers are encouraged to attend teaching technique and research methodology workshops organized at various levels. The institute monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching learning through Co-Ordination Committee with the faculty members which collects feedback from the students and on the basis of such feedback, monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching learning.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the College in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum

The Institute follows the rules and regulations given by the State Govt. of Maharashtra, Dr.Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad and UGC. The College is always ready to recruit qualified teachers. The College seeks the permission for recruitment; teachers are recruited by the procedure as follows. First of all, the institute takes permission from Joint Director of higher education and then from university with reservation criteria. After this, advertisement is given in National / State level news papers. After getting applications in response to these, the eligible candidates are scrutinized. Thereafter the College applies to the affiliating University for a panel of expert to conduct the interview. Call letters are issued to qualified candidates for interview. This expert panel consists of the following members.

- * Three subject experts deputed by Dr.Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad in which to VC Nominees.
- * Principal of the College.
- * President of the College Management Committee. Or a person nominated by management.
- * Govt Nominee
- * HOD if available.

The above said committee conducts the interview as per the guidelines issued by the Dr.Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad and

selects the eligible and most competent candidates. Preference is given to the candidates having Ph. D and experience. After giving them the appointment letters, the approval is sought from the university. To retain available staff, they are paid salaries according to the rules and regulations by the Govt. of Maharashtra and UGC. Presently the College has following qualified faculties.

The vacancies are advertised in the National/State/Local newspapers and applications are invited from the qualified candidates. The faculty members are selected as per the guideline of the State Govt., Parent University and UGC. The Selection Committee is formed as per the guidelines of UGC and the Parent University. The Selection Committee has a Vice-Chancellor Nominee, a State Government Nominee, three Subject Experts and the Head of the Department, Management Nominee and the Principal. The selection is done purely on merit cum reservation norms. The College has enough number of qualified teachers and they are competent. The Management and the Principal appoint temporary teachers to fulfill the vacancies. The Institution has 08 Ph.D., 05 NET/ SET, 07 M. Phil. holders in the College. The academic year 2014-15 fifteen faculties are appointed. In the year 2015-16 sixteen temporary faculties had been appointed.

2.4.2 How does the Institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT,

Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the Institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

To meet the need of qualified teachers for faculty of Science the College strives hard to appoint regular faculty. The College Science faculty is on 100% non-grant basis. In the unavailability of the regular teachers, the College seeks the services of the teachers on the clock hour basis. Guest lectures are also organized for this purpose. Demands of students and parents, College has started faculty of Commerce (B.Com) from the academic year 2014-15.

2.4.3 Providing details on staff development programmes during the last four years elaborate on the strategies adopted by the Institution in enhancing the teacher quality.

The College takes care that the teachers receive required training periodically to enhance their teaching quality. Teachers are motivated to pursue research degrees within the stipulated period. Such teachers are given space in the form of study leaves and duty leaves to complete their work. The teachers are also encouraged to participate in training programmes like OP, RC, Special Summer/winter courses and short term courses on Research/ Teaching Methodology. The teachers are prompted to attend and contribute in the Seminars, Conferences and Workshops.

- At present the College follows the PBAS API system to evaluate teacher's performance.
- The Peers evaluated teacher's performance at the time of CAS.
- Student's feedback is collected about the teaching performance of the teachers.
- There is a suggestion box where the students can drop their complaints if any. The contents of the box are analyzed on a monthly basis and suitable measures are taken to redress the grievances.
- During the term-wise meetings of departments, the feedback is analysed and passed on to the Principal who in turn sends such teachers for training, refresher courses or orientation programmes. Such teachers are guided to seek help from their seniors.

Evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process

Such evaluation goes a long way in improving the quality of the teaching learning process in a sense that a teacher comes to know about strengths and shortcomings and improve his/her shortcomings and even better his/her strengths. In case the teacher remains reluctant, he is sacked.

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2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the Institution ensure that the stakeholders of the Institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

To ensure that the stakeholders of the Institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes; the Institution takes the following measures:

- The evaluation methods are communicated through the Prospectus, Notice Board and even through Announcements in the class rooms.
- In the first meeting with the students, they are well informed about the evaluation programme and methods of the unit.
- If a student falls short of lectures, the parents are intimated and requested to discuss the matter with HOD/ Principal personally.
- Students and faculty members and even the parents of the students informed about evolution process by giving information in the prospectus.
- Terms to terms staff meetings are also conducted.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the Institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the Institution on its own?

Evaluation Reforms initiated by University:

- The affiliating University has adopted semester pattern instead of annual pattern.
- For the first year of the degree course entire college assessment is followed.
- The Semester system has replaced annual examination method in all UG classes already.
- Table-marking has been introduced to ensure fair evaluation.
- The parents are communicated their ward's progress during the Parent Teacher Meet and through informal meetings.
- Internal assessment is awarded to the students as per the parent university criteria.
- For the final year of the degree course, The University has prescribed a project work as research activity.

2.5.3 How does the Institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the Institution on its own?

Grievance and Redressal mechanism is at the College and university level. Suggestion box is made available to the students for their grievances. The assessed answer sheets and assignments are returned to the students and their grievance is redressed, if they have any. After the declaration of the university result the students are informed regarding the provision of the recounting, re-evaluation and photocopying through oral interaction and notice board. The students can go for both as per the university norms. If there is more than 10 % difference in the evaluation the students are benefited

The Institution has implemented evaluation reforms made by the Parent University. Annual evaluation pattern is replaced by the semester system for all UG courses from the year 2009-10. The semester evaluation is according to 40% internal marks and 60% marks are allotted for theory examination. The College conducts tests, tutorials and seminars to evaluate the students. The semester evaluation has been changed from the academic year 2013-14, there is no internal assessment prescribed by the Parent University. 100% marks are allotted for theory examination

A few examples which have positively impacted the system

- During the academic session of 2012-13 the College bagged the Medal in University Exams.
- In the Youth Festival 2011 the College lifted Central General Championship Trophy.
- The College has made tremendous contribution to university sports.
- Students trained appear in competitions at district, state, national and international level
- A neighboring village, Salunkwadi, has been adopted.
- After the adoption of this village the NSS Unit have bonded with the villagers and given their best to uplift them economically, socially as well as educationally. Right from beginning students are working for their hygienic awareness to making them economically self-sufficient and independent. Our students have changed the face of the village.

- Not only has the local community benefited; the students too have experienced the joy that comes from selfless service. In order to bring smiles on the faces of deprived people, students visit the local Orphanage, Hospital on important festivals for distribution of fruits among them.
- The College has the fine practice of raising funds and collecting other valuable materials to help the victims of natural calamities.

Weight-age is given for behavioral aspects, independent learning and communication skills.

- A number of associations and committees have been constituted so that the students realize their fullest potential to achieve their targets.
- Through lectures training is imparted in life skills, knowledge- management skills and lifelong learning.
- The recruitment policy of the College ensures the selection of candidates purely on merit and strictly according to the norms laid down by UGC
- The evaluation process is student- friendly and reliable.
- A number of effective measures have been adopted to assess the performance of faculty to prevent their stagnation and complacency.

The special classes are organized accordingly. In such cases, methods like peer learning and group learning are used.

The College has formed co-ordination committee to collect and analyze data on student learning outcomes.

The teachers take clue from the answer sheet of internal exams of a student and point out some area of improvement. During the oral test, some students were found poor in communication skills. Such students were given special attention to improve their communication skills.

Students better in the GK are encouraged to participate in competitive exams. Active students are sent for Youth Festival and NSS camps for various levels. The college has received loads of cultural and sports awards.

Service for holistic development of students with the help of *Vasundhara Krida Probodhani* organizes programs like 'Art of Living' and various games coaching in this camp. Every Year College also organizes Open Art Festival.

The College has always-great feeling about the increasing access of students from poverty stricken, labor class, farming society, rural students and specially the students of this undeveloped area to higher education. As per the rules

and regulations of Govt. of Maharashtra/Central Govt., we have been providing reservation, financial aids, scholarship and relaxation in qualification for socially backward class. The aims and objectives achieved by providing higher education to create just, plural and equitable society. The major strength of the College is trying to ensure the holistic development to make them good citizens. The Institution is established to provide knowledge and value based education to all the sections of society. The Institute is conscious of its role in campus-community connection, well being of its neighborhood and has initiated a number of community development activities. The College is organizing NSS camp with the Assistance of surrounding local Regional Gram Panchayat, Village and Council. SHABDAI platform is available for a new writers and surrounding peoples. The College has made an invaluable contribution to Government and Non Government Organizations by organizing and imparting awareness programmes. The College every year organizes 7 days camp called *Gram Swachata Abhiyan* in the villages as a part of social responsibility. In that camp a special lecture series was delivered, in which lectures of various types were delivered for example, nurturing of cattle's, Militancy: A Global Problem, The Role of Self Help Group in women Empowerment, Challenges in front of Today's Youth, We also helped affected peoples in disaster situations and natural calamities. The College has organized publication ceremony for surrounding writer. The College has donated 8000/ Rs for NAAM Foudation. The college also helped and donated 3500/Rs for the Lokjagar Bhauuddesia Sevabhavi Sanstha Patoda worked for child welfare in the society.

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities, which promote citizenship roles?

The Institute motivates students for participating in various social activities and extra curriculum activities. The Institute has motivated the students to maintain plastic free campus by banning the use of plastic in the campus. Environment awareness campaign is conducted by NSS department. Plantation programme is undertaken in the month of June and July by NSS department in the campus. Free plants are provided to students by College from its nursery plant. Medical check-up camp organized for students. We provide basic computer education to our support staff and students. Students actively participate in Pulse Polio programme and other vaccinations programmes.

Aids awareness programme- On the occasions of the birth and death anniversary of national leaders and social reformers, the programmes like elocution competitions, debate competitions and essay writings have been arranged by various departments of the College. Some students are sent to the debate competitions organized by various Colleges, and universities with help of the

Cultural Department. For last two years, our one student from NSS unit has been participating in *UTKARSH*. The College organized the anti- ragging awareness programme with the help of anti-ragging committee. The NSS unit also runs 'The Red Ribbon club' by which the department spreads the awareness about the blood donation. These activities help students to grow with social responsibilities and establish harmony.

3.6.3 How does the Institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the Institution?

The College communicates with the all stakeholders by our College prospectus. There is reflection of vision, mission and objectives. The College website provides adequate space to this mission. They find place in all the offices of the College, Library and other major departments of the College. Immediately after admission, the students are made aware of these mission and objectives. The Institute has evolved a stakeholder's web by forming different platform like Research Committee, Alumni with a fair representation of students. At the beginning of the academic year our faculty visits surrounding and arrounding Jr. Colleges. Teacher/head of department/Principal interact with guardians. They are informed about their wards academic performance and attendance records through meetings, phone calls, social media like face book, what's app and direct interaction of the guardians with the H.O.D. is also encouraged. Opinions of parents are considered with respect to various aspects. Parents are allowed to meet the teachers, Coordinators and Principal on any day of the week at any time to make any suggestions or complaints. The College is situated near Railway Station on Ahmadpur Road, National High Way no.-156. The area of the College campus is 2.09 acres. It comprises 27 teaching class rooms, <u>04</u> Laboratories, Administrative Room and Library section, Assembly Hall, ladies common room l, Parking facilities, canteen, a small garden, Drinking water, lavatories and urinal facilities are available for the students, exstudents and staff. It is used for co-curricular activities, extra-curricular activities, sports and academic activities, social activities.

- a) Curricular and co-curricular activities classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, halls, bathroom, sanitary and cold RO water, laboratories, specialized facilities like LCD projector, computers, internet facilities and other equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.
- **b)** Extra-curricular activities Sports, outdoor and indoor games. NSS cultural activities, social awareness activities, skill development, health and hygiene etc

The College is endowed with physical infrastructure facilities to support the teaching – learning process. The main campus is spread over 2.09 acres of Land. A master plan has been prepared for the campus. Our College has spacious multipurpose hall, adequate number of classrooms, few chambers well equipped laboratories. The College has a separate block for administration. The library is

with an inadequate space, large number of books and journals, internet and other support facilities.

a. CURRICULAR AND CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

- I) Classrooms Classrooms with approximately 200sq.ft, 400 Sq. ft.and.600 sq. ft with proper ventilation. There is sufficient number of windows which provide natural light so the classroom hardly needs artificial lights.
- **II) Technology Enabled learning facility** The College has separate provision of projector, facility and broad band internet connection.
- **III) Seminar hall** The College has one seminar hall, which is regularly used for conducting seminars and cultural programmes, work shop and various academic programmes.
- **IV) Laboratories**: The College has 4 laboratories i.e. Physics, Chemistry, Zoology and Botany to conduct the regular practical of the students.

V) Specialized facilities and equipment, available for teaching, learning and research

The College has established well-equipped 30 computers. Computer lab is available. The ratio of computers and students 1:25. The staff and students are given free access to internet so that they can enrich their knowledge and then in turn the students can benefit from their experience and knowledge.

b. EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

- **Sports** In sports, our College provides indoor and outdoor games to students.
- **Indoor games-** Facilities for the sport chess and carom are provided to the students in the College.
- Outdoor games A specious half acre play ground is available for outdoor games i.e. Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Athletics and Volleyball in College campus. The play ground is existed and used for outdoor games.
- NSS. College has a NSS. Unit of 100 students. The Various socially relevant services are provided by NSS. Students, like participation in blood donation camps, and the rallies are organized on the various issues like female foeticide. The students also participate in pulse polio programme. Seven days special programme has been organized at nearby villages where rural are awakened with different programmes.

- IT Activity: Our faculty member department of computer science has created *Bhimachi Lekhani* android app on the occasion of Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar 125th Birth Anniversary. Now it is available on Google play store. It is free app, anyone can download it.
- Cultural Activities The College has been regularly participating in the university level youth festivals. The students have been participating in all academic, theatrical and musical activities. The College also organizes the annual gathering where students get opportunities to expose their hidden talent through various events. Every Year College has been organized debate competition

Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.

Our College has special concern for the health and hygiene. In order to provide basic facilities, proper arrangement of drinking water attached with RO. First aid box is made available by the Institution. In any emergency case, the College is near

from local Primary Health Center, Ghatnandur. The medical officers from hospital co-operate with the institute staff in such cases.

Free blood donation and blood group check up camp, free general medical camp are frequently organized by the College.

Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

5.1.8 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

The Career Counseling is working in our College. The teacher in charge is available to guide the students about the job opportunities/employments. The Counseling Cell makes adequate arrangement for the guidance of the students during the time of admission. The students seeking admissions are counseled in the choice making matter during admissions. The choice of the career and the doubts of the students are listened to very carefully and solutions of the problems are provided.

> Academic and career counseling

The students at the time of the admission are helped by the faculty in choosing right subjects. They are informed about the scope and nature of the various subjects from the syllabus. The students are not pressurized in choosing the subject. They are given right kind of counseling which helps them to shape their career. Special lectures are organized for the student's development.

> Personal and Psycho-Social Counseling

The faculty provides students personal counseling. The students can share their problems with the teachers. The teachers are very supportive in guiding them to fight their problems. The teachers make it sure that no such bad or worse happens with the psycho-social understanding of the students. They are counseled to become better human being and advised to stand strong for the social cause. Anti-ragging Committee, Women Grievance and Redressal Committee, Medical and psycho analytical camps are organized for this purpose.

5.1.9 Does the Institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students? The Institute has Career Counseling Cell. After completion of Degree, students go for further education like M.A, M. Sc., B.C.A, and B.Ed. The students are informed regarding the vacancies offered by govt. / private sectors and other agencies. Employment notices are displayed; notices of the advertisements are displayed on the notice boards. The students are informed regarding the last date and other important information regarding the vacancies. The College arranges extra coaching from external agency; they guide our students about job opportunities and the students get benefit from it.

Yes. The Grievance Redressal Cell actively interacts with the students to help them to sort out their grievances. It attends to both registered and unregistered grievances of the students. The students drop their grievances in the suggestion box. Students are also free to share their grievances with the teachers and the Principal also. The necessary action is taken after issues are discussed in the concerned committee. No such grievance is reported in the last five years.

Committee against Sexual Harassment is constituted to take all the necessary measures to ensure the safety and the dignity of the female students. The committee comprises the counselors and members. Till date no such case of sexual harassment has been reported in the Institution. The strict punishment provisions to prevent sexual harassment of student are informed to the students through the meetings. For the awareness of the sexual harassment rules, our College invited Asst. Police Inspector of the Ambajogai Police station for the guidance to the students. With this, the government of Maharashtra runs *Jagar Janiwancha Abhiyan* for awareness of the sexual harassment of the female gender. Apart from this Institute is observing the activities of the students, staff and visitors.

and he bears the ultimate responsibility for the smooth running of the College. The role of the Principal of the College is multi-dimensional. As a head of the College the Principal is responsible for both the academic and administrative functioning of the College. He prepares the agenda for Governing Body meetings. He places academic and administrative matters before the LMC for approval. He is responsible for executing all decisions. He is also responsible for all correspondence with the Governing Body, Dr Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad, Govt. of Maharashtra, Central Govt. and UGC. The Principal maintains the reports from various College committees. He offers advice and suggestions in terms of functions. In this way the Principal motivates the teaching and non-teaching faculty of the College.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the Institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the Institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The Principal of the Institution has powers to govern the Institution according to the rules and regulations of Management, Govt. of Maharashtra, UGC and the Parent University. In the beginning of the academic year, IQAC conducts the meeting with staff. By taking into consideration the potential and creativity of each person, the responsibilities and duties are being allotted. For the smooth functioning, the Principal with the consent of the Governing Body and discussion with IQAC, official notices are issued. The committee prepares action plan and submits to the Principal for its approval. At the end of the session the committee submits the report about work done to the head of Institution. All these activities are monitored and evaluated by IQAC. The teaching faculty and non -teaching faculty are being informed about their duties and responsibilities through meetings and written notices.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The Management of the College is in constant touch with the Principal and has an amicable support with the head of the Institution. In the Institution the members of the Management Committee meet frequently and the problems and issues related to the College development, administration, appointment and infrastructural needs and student disciplines are discussed. In Local Management Committee meetings, head of the Institute and some staff members nominated by the Management are also present to provide information and suggestions if any. In the meetings the responsibilities are defined and communicated to the staff through the head of the Institution. If the situation demands, the President of the Management Committee holds meeting with the teachers to communicate directly and bestows the responsibilities. The teaching as well as the non-teaching and supporting staff follows instructions and obey the orders in the interest of the Institution.

6.1.6 How does the College groom leadership at various levels?

The Management is always encouraging and supporting the involvement of the staff in the improvement of the effectiveness and an efficiency of the Institutional process. The Management through the Principal of the College involves the staff members in various activities related to the development of the College. The staff members are involved by way of formation of various committees such as building committee, advisory committee, discipline committee, examination committee etc. The representatives of teaching and non-teaching employees are being appointed on the Local Management Committee who actively participates in decision making process. For the best working of committees the Principal always motivates the staff members involved in committees. The Management and Principal of the College prompt faculties to fill their nomenclatures in various elections of university. All these activities help faculties to groom leadership at various stages.

6.1.7 How does the College delegate authority provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the Institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

A decentralized functioning of the Institution empowers the quality of Institution in all aspects. The Faculty members participate in every activity and action plan. The Principal conducts regular meetings with teaching and non-teaching staff for the effective implementations, suggestions/opinions from all members are always welcomed. Departmental meetings are taken in consultation with teaching / non- teaching faculty. These decisions are reviewed by higher authorities /committees in case of needs. At the beginning of academic year various committees are formed and each committee is being empowered to execute its action plans. These various committees help us to decentralize the governance. NSS, Cultural and Sports departments have such authority.

6.1.8 Does the College promote a culture of participative management? If "YES" indicate the levels of participative management?

The College can proudly boast of a participative management. The management actively takes part in the working of the College. The Head of the management is in the leading role in governance and management of the Institution. He along with the other members of the committee keenly observes the day to day working of the College administration, governance, management and academic activities. He inspires the staff members in staff meetings and by personal interaction to give their best in their teaching assignments. He communicates to the teachers, the decisions taken by the management and ensures that all the points are implemented properly. He is responsible to constitute different committees involving the staff members. He looks after the financial expenditure and manages the fund for the different developmental activities taking place at the campus.

6.2. Strategy Development and deployment

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Yes, the Institution has formally stated quality policy. A number of steps have been taken to translate quality to its various units by the College. IQAC

monitors the activities and plans proposed by various departments for the calendar year. IQAC with regular interval of time takes feedback from every department. The Governing Council grants permission for the prospective plans prepared for the stakeholders. Then it is placed before the teachers, student representatives and administrators for discussion. Then it finalizes and submits to the governing council for scrutiny and implementation. In the academic units teachers are encouraged to participate in seminars, conferences, workshops, short term courses, conclaves and refreshers/orientation courses to update their knowledge. The faculty has been provided all the latest communication technology for teaching/learning purpose.

6.2.2 Does the institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

The Institution has a perspective plan for its infrastructural and academic growth. The Institution has two acres of land and has its own building. As far as the infrastructural growth is concerned we have adequate classrooms and playground but we have yet to develop library building, science laboratories and administrative building. The Institution has 642 students and the present infrastructure is inadequate for the present strength. We desire to provide qualitative higher education which will provide employment to students. Hence the graduates who are passing from this Institution should be enabled with high potential and will be able to face the global competition. In future, the Institution desires to begin vocational courses introduced by UGC from time to time. It will help students to earn while they are learning. In future we also intend to begin new courses which will be more useful to students. The perspective Institutional plan is developed following the procedure of involving the cooperation of teachers, students and members of the Managing Committee. In order to formulate the strategy of development and deployment, the committees are constituted for each and every developmental work. Teachers have to participate in all the Institutional plans and wherever the situation demands, students and members of Management Committee are involved. The meeting of students is summoned to take their participation by means of selection of some students. In the Cultural Committee and Magazine Committee students are involved along with the teachers. In the committees related to infrastructural developments, the Principal is chairman and teachers are the members.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

Our parent Institution Kamdhenu Sevabhavi Sanstha, Ghatnandur Tq. Ambajogai, Dist Beed, after the selection procedure of a new employee, the president of the Governing Body issues appointment letters, joining and approval procedure is to be completed by the Principal of the College. The policy decisions taken by the executive council are communicated directly to the Principal by written letters and its execution is done through the Principal of the College. LMC oversees the functioning of both the academic and administrative aspects of

Institution. LMC meets twice a year for discussion of various issues. The Principal is the head of the academic and administrative departments of the College. The HODs are in-charge of academic and administrative functioning of the departments. The teaching staff takes care of curricular aspects and keeps a watch on the activities related to co-curricular and extra-curricular aspects.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the Institution for each of the following

• Teaching and Learning

The Management ensures effective and efficient transaction of the teaching learning Process by:

- Recruiting highly qualified and competent teaching faculty.
- Promoting professional development of faculty by providing support.
- To undergo refresher/orientation/summer/winter school courses.
- To equip themselves in modern pedagogical tools.
- To pursue doctoral programme we have eight teachers with Ph. D.
- To attend and organize National and International Seminars/conferences/workshops.
- Communicating student feedback to every faculty.
- To recruit the versatile teachers at the time of the appointment.
- To prepare the Academic Calendar as per the university rule.

Research and Development

The College has established Research Committee to promote Research culture among faculties and students.

- More than 90% faculties are actively engaged in research activities.
- As many as 04 teachers are pursuing their Minor Projects.
- One teacher is recognized research supervisor and four faculty applied for guideship to the affiliated University.
- Students are promoted to participate in Research activities.
- The College is planning to have the online journal to promote research environment.
- The Principal has been motivating the faculty to write research projects and apply to UGC. for research schemes

• Community Engagement

The College has one unit of NSS. The College encourages students to take part in NSS and other extension activities. Comprehensive projects are undertaken by the students in collaboration with the community. The College has also established Women Empowerment Cell. The College organizes various outreach programmes to enable the students to respond to the larger issues of society. The College organizes blood donation camps, NSS camps, Student Rallies on the Aids day, Voter awareness Rallies etc. free medical check-up, youth festivals, Tree

plantation festival etc. The College also organizes Awareness Programmes on vital issues like Female Foeticide, Drug Addiction, HIV/AIDS, etc. The surveys like Toilet availability at village level and the socio-economic position of laborers in surrounding villages are being undertaken by the College. The College has organized marriage ceremony for the poor and needy people in the local community.

• Human Resource Management.

There are many staff welfare schemes. The Institution recruits faculty members and staff based on the guidelines provided by the University. Effective system of A.P.I. of teachers is existed. Communication system with all the stakeholders is very good.

• Industry Interaction

Faculty members and students from departments of Economics/ Geography organized industrial tours to various industries like; sugar, cloth mill, milk projects etc. Students get the first hand knowledge and learn a lot from these visits.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the Institution ensure that adequate information [from feedback and personal contact etc.] is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the Institution?

The Management and head of the Institution are always in interactive mode with each other. The Head of Institution and Local Management Committee get the feedback from teachers, students and the public with regards to the teaching quality, curriculum, extra -curricular activities and infrastructural demands. In the meetings of the Management Committee the information gathered from different sources is discussed with the participating members. After through discussion and deliberation the existing facilities and activities of the Institution are reviewed and decisions are taken for their implementation after going through the available resources and modalities.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the Institutional process?

The Management is always encouraging and supporting the involvement of the staff in the improvement of the effectiveness and efficiency of the Institutional process. The Management through the Head of the Institution involves the staff members in various activities related to the development of the College. The staff members are involved by way of constitution of various committees such as Building Committee, Admission Committee, Advisory Committee, Examination Committee, Research Committee, Purchase Committee, Alumni and Parent Meet Committee.

6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the management council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

The Management passed the following resolutions in the meetings of the last year:

- Resolution is passed for the regularization of services of employees.
- Resolution is passed for the recruitment of the post of Assist Professors in Arts faculty.
- Resolution is passed regarding the interviews of Assist Professors in science faculty.
- Resolution is passed to undergo the process of NAAC.
- These resolved issues are implemented in this year.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated Institution? If 'yes' what are the efforts made by the Institution in obtaining autonomy.

The University has a provision of status of autonomy but we have not applied for status of autonomy for the Institution.

6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The Institute has well defined grievance redressal procedure. Prompt and effective disposal of grievances of various stakeholders are being done. The Institute has constituted a Grievances Redressal Committee. This committee discusses the matter with the Principal to solve the problems. It has been regular practice for the faculty and Principal to meet the students in or out the classroom to get their grievances if any. We are very happy to say that no major grievances are reported in the last few sessions. Adequate representation is given to female employees on the Grievance Redressal Cell.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the court on there.

There is no court cases filed by Institute and against the Institute.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on Institutional performance? If 'yes' what was the outcome and response of the Institution to such an effort?

The Institution has a clearly set and defined mechanism of obtaining the feedback from the students to improve the performance and quality of the Institutional provisions. Further it is used to improve the overall competency of the students. Faculty obtains the information of problems of students from the above policy. Good results are gained by the Institution in both academic and

administrative work. The measures are taken to solve the problems. Feedback form is being taken from the students where students freely state the problems they are facing. The feedback given by the students is in turn communicated to the entire faculty in written and directs them to improve the matters where they are lacking behind. The Institution is getting tips/suggestions to improve in all manners through this feedback method.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the Institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

The Management and the Principal are able to rightly identify faculty members' individual strengths, areas of interest and accordingly assign responsibilities. Responsibilities of every staff are communicated to them through notices that clearly define their role in the implementation of any given assignments. Besides they are also informally counseled so as to make them aware of their duties. The Institution promotes professional development of the faculty to the greatest possible extent. Many efforts are being made to enhance the professional development of teaching and non-teaching staff. The College promotes the faculty to participate in refresher, orientation, short term, Science conclaves and workshops. The Principal encourages them to undertake various research projects in the form of major and minor projects. Faculty members of the Institution actively participate in national and international seminars and conferences. The Institution encourages faculty members to enroll for orientation, refresher and short term courses and workshops. Some of the faculty members are on the editorial boards of various journals and books. Non-teaching employees are being sent to Pune/ Aurangabad for professional development programmes and workshops.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the Institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

There are relevant rules in the Institution regarding the faculty empowerment. These rules pertain to attending seminars, conferences, refreshers and orientation courses, and other training programmes. The need of such training is assessed by the Heads of Departments who recommend Members of the faculty for such programmes. The Head of the Institution suggests the names of senior faculty who need to be trained for administrative positions when promotions are due. The CAS benefits are being given to each employee who is eligible for it. At the Institutional level the College Management motivates faculty members through prompt appreciation of exceptional merit and talent and by honoring them at the time of annual gathering.

6.3.3. Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The achievement of faculty members are monitored and updated in the College records. Performance appraisal system is implemented as per the guidelines from Dr BAMU Aurangabad and UGC. The PBAS of faculty is filled by individually on the basis of his/her yearly achievements, discipline, quality etc. The faculty is supposed to submit their self appraisals annually to the Principal. Besides this the assessment of the teachers comes through feedback forms from students which in turn indicate the teacher's quality and expectations. Students are expected to fill the feedback forms for all the teachers concerned with their classes. The feedback forms have a well defined set of questions that help the students to evaluate the teaching capacity based on lecture understanding and define how far the teacher has succeeded in reaching out to the students. These details are accessible to the staff so as to help them to judge their performance.

The Principal understands the students' reflections and shares it collectively and individually among the staff. If there are any issues of concern the faculty member is facilitated to overcome the lacunae without lowering self- esteem. Wherever, required counseling is provided to staff in order to help them to improve their professional capabilities. The Head of the Institution also uses evaluation in an informal way to improve the service of the office staff.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The performance appraisal reports duly filled are being assessed by the Principal and the Management. The Management plays an active role in the performance appraisal of the staff. The Management keeps a vigil on the professional behavior and attitude of the members of the teaching as well as the non-teaching faculty. Annual increments and placement in the grades are all implemented under the signatures of the Managing Committee and due recognition and increments are given to the teachers who have completed their Ph.D. Likewise; the Management ensures expeditious implementation of all the benefits after the appraisal of the faculty. The Management takes effective decisions and the decisions taken are incorporated in the proceedings of the meetings of the Managing Committee and Governing Body.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and nonteaching staff? What percentage of staff availed the benefits of such schemes in last four years?

The strategies adopted by Govt. of Maharashtra for faculty welfare include career advancement benefits for those with higher qualifications such as Ph.D. as well as opportunities for those who wish to improve their qualifications. The Government and affiliating university has implemented following social welfare schemes:

- 10 medical leaves are given to every employee in one academic year.
- There is a provision of maternity leave of six months and paternity leave for 10 days

- An insurance policy of LIC is given to the staff members whose premium is automatically deducted from their salaries.
- Provident fund.
- To avail the facility of Loan from various banks, the Institution provides all legal documents. All the faculty members are benefited by welfare schemes.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

A lot of measures are taken by the Institute for attracting and retaining eminent faculty. A handsome salary is offered to the faculty according to their experience and qualification. The Management offers fair treatment to faculty in terms of sharing of administrative responsibilities and representation in committees. The academic input given to the entire faculty body makes them appreciative of the academic environment. Periodic revision of pay is done for the Management faculty. Their teaching experience prior to being recruited in this College is considered for increment in their pay. Similarly, Ph.D. holders get three additional increments. Irrespective of their years of teaching experience, permission is granted for the faculty to pursue their Ph.D. Service rules are employee friendly and the Management faculty feels comfortable with them. Faculties are relieved to attend the various workshops and provided DL for the said purpose.

6.4 Financial management and Resource mobilization

6.4.1 What is the Institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The financial resources of the College are managed in a very effective and foolproof manner. The Proper accounts are maintained by College through cashbook, ledger and voucher file each and every transaction is supported by the vouchers. All the collections are deposited in the bank. Only duly authorized persons can operate through the bank. All expenditure recurring and nonrecurring are incurred through checks. Audit is done by the authorized chartered accountant. For efficient use of financial resources the budget is prepared in the month of April for next year. All financial matters are supervised by the Administrative Committee.

6.4.2 What are the Institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the measure audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The accounts of the College are subjected to audit by the external authorized chartered accountant per year. We don't have the internal audit mechanism but the Advisory Committee supervises a check on accounts of the College. Suggestions are given to the accountant in this regard. The Joint Director office including accounts officer of higher education inspects the audited statements and other financial matters. We have completed the assessment up to

financial year 2010-11. No major objections were taken in the assessment. Internal audit has been accomplished up to Year 2015-16.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of Institutional receipt/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The major sources of funding for College are as follows:

- Total fees collected from the students.
- Grants received from State Govt. for salary only.
- Donation from Management Members.

Whenever there is a need of financial assistance the College demands to Management and it is fulfilled by the Management from time to time.

Deficit Management

The College receives 100 % of the grants-in-aid from the Government of Maharashtra.

Reserve Funds

The institution has deposited the required reserve funds as per the university guidelines. Audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years are completed.

6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the Institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

The College devises various ways and means to mobilize the resources it needs for the welfare of the students. Some of the methods used by the College towards achieving these goals are given below:

- The Institution has organized inter-collegiate and state level sports events. The expenditure for such events is to be partially borne by the affiliating university and partially by the College.
- The faculty of the College contributes for regularly which is used to help sincere and needy students.
- In collaboration with DR. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad we have organized 'Rajarshri Shahu Maharaj Lecture Series' where we received Rs. 5000/ grants from the university.
- In collaboration with DR. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad we have organized 'Late. Vasantrao Kale Swabhiani Earn and Learn' where we received Rs. 6000/ grants from the university and College also spent its own Rs 6000/- in it.

• DR. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, in collaboration with Student Welfare Department, Aurangabad has organized 'General Knowledge Competitive Exam 2015' where we received Rs. 5000/ grants from the university.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System [IQAS]

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell [IQAC]

a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

The College has established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). The Internal Quality Assurance Cell is formed as per the structure of (NAAC). It includes the Management representative, the Head of the Institution, one member from local community, five senior teachers, the administrative officer and the Coordinator. The vision and the missions of the College are discussed in detail in the changing context. IQAC has given space for the innovative ideas to be implemented in the college. The recommendation and remarks of the IQAC have helped the college to gear up its academic and extension activities.

b. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management / authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

Almost all the feasible decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management and institution as it has representation for the management also.

The details are as given below:

- The practice of preparing the academic calendar is discussed among Principal, Heads of the Departments, co-ordinators of various committees and the administrative staff.
- The proper co-ordination of different academic, curricular and extracurricular activities is made effective through meeting and discussion implementation of feedback mechanism by various stakeholders.
- Daily Teaching Report (DTR) and teacher's teaching plan help to improve the academics systematically.
- Various committees are formed for initiating, execution and monitoring of activities of the College such as admission committee, coordination committee, discipline committee, etc.
- Curricular, co- curricular and extra-curricular activities are organized to achieve students overall development.
- Through NSS unit of the College we inculcate patriotism and the spirit of social service among the students.
- Sports activities play prominent role to maintain mental as well as physical health of the students.

- The College has Auditorium Hall for conducting academic activities.
- Departmental Associations promotes creative talent of the students.
- Parents and Alumni meets are useful for getting feedback from the stakeholders.
- Student's feedbacks about teachers, courses and support services are found very helpful for quality assurance.
- Use of ICT has enhanced teaching learning process.
- Career Guidance and Placement Cell helps students for employment in various fields.
- IQAC is established to monitor the activities and to implement quality sustenance measures in the campus.
- Students Council plays an important role in the process of decision making.
- Regular meetings between staff, Principal, Management and non-teaching staff are held to maintain monitor the works of the Institution.

Within the existing academic and administrative system the Institution has developed mechanisms of its own for the quality assurance. The academic quality of the Institution is evaluated on the basis of the performance of the students in their examination. The teachers also judge the student's academic abilities by way of question – answers and written tests. The poor students are helped by the teachers to improve their academic quality by taking extra classes, guidance, providing notes and additional reading material. The administrative system also looks after the quality education in the Institutions. The different committees set up by the Institutions are always aware to the administrative needs. The Coodrdination Committee, the Examination Committee, the Annual Magazine Committee and the Finance Committee are also constituted and are well equipped for quality assurance of the Institution's administration.

The academic quality of the Institution is maintained by the teaching and learning process. The administrative quality is maintained by the effective function carried out by the various committees. The two mechanisms are interdependent and therefore there is no scope for any failure in any system. The students play a major role in assuring quality of education imparted by the Institution. It is through their active participation in classrooms that the quality of the education is maintained. The College is trying to make the students punctual and make them to attend classes regularly. They approach to the teachers for the solution of their problems related to their syllabus. Their participation is also assured involving them in cultural and other extension activities. The students also approach to the Head of Institution directly for the Redressal of their problems. The best practices in the Institution have been promoted among the faculties and students.

In order to improve the functioning of academic and administrative system the Institution has internalized the best practices. The insistence on students' participation in academic and administrative matters has improved the quality of education and administration in the Institution. The administration in the Institution is maintained by the involvement of staff at every level. The examinations are held quite smoothly by the active participation of the staff. The teachers have been quite

supportive to the academic needs of the students by offering them reading material and extra classes.

IQAC have the external members on its committee. Since they are the representatives from society, administration and management we are being benefitted by their experience.

d. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

The students and the alumni members are aware of the needs of the locality and ground reality. They help to plan the activities and offer cooperation wherever necessary. The student representative suggested the idea of undertaking extension activities for the local students. The alumni representative offered the idea of sponsoring some of the activities by the alumni association. The alumni also contribute in enhancing the internal quality by making important suggestions in the alumni meets.

The main task of IQAC being quality assurance, planning and monitoring the projects undertaken, it accomplishes through the following:

- Disseminating information on the various quality parameters of higher Education.
- Reviewing the existing Programmes and introducing new age programmes relevant to the present educational scenario.
- Promoting Research and creating an atmosphere conducive to research.
- Promoting the use of technology for enhanced teaching learning.
- Imparting value based education.
- Documenting the various quality enhancing programmes / activities of the College.
- Consolidating the Feed Back responses from students and other stakeholders.

The IQAC meetings are conducted after every four months for the planning and implementation of quality enhancement measures and the decisions are taken communicated to the staff and students through in-house meetings of various committees for effective execution.

e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The very constitution of the IQAC speaks of the engagement of the staff from different constitutes of the institution. The director of Physical Education, the in charge of the Extension activities (NSS) and representative of a lady teacher are appointed on the IQAC to give due representation to the core constituents of the college. The formal notice of the quarterly IQAC meeting and its decisions are communicated to them in written form.

6.5.2 Does the Institution have an integrated frame work for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'Yes' give details on its operationalization

'Yes' the Institution has adapted three ways system where the Governing Council is the ultimate decision making body accountable to the stakeholders. The IQAC planning body collects references from the learners and various committees through participatory interaction based on which it proposes comprehensive perspective plan to the LMC for approval and implementation. The heads of committees are in charge of implementation of developmental and academic activities assigned by the LMC. The fair representation of the learners ensures the transparency in the process.

6.5.3 Does the Institution provide the training to its staff for effective implementation? Of the quality Assurance producers? If 'Yes' give details enumerating its impact.

The Institution ensures that the decisions based on the findings of the IQAC are fully adhered too. The academic as well as the administrative working is further

smoothened by deputing the teaching staff to refresher/orientation courses and non-teaching staff to professional development programmes at Academic Staff College Pune. Faculty is also deputed to various workshops organized by Colleges in the jurisdiction. The IQAC of the college has organized one day workshop on NAAC with the collaboration of other colleges.

6.5.4 Does the Institution undertake academic audit or other external review of the academic provision? If 'yes' how are the outcomes used to improve the Institutional activities?

The Institution is affiliated with Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad. The University has not its self mechanism to audit the academic working of College by the University which visits the College and asses the academic performance of the College. It communicates the shortcomings which are to be rectified, corrected by the College till the next visit of the committee. The instructions, rules and regulations strictly followed through processes like admissions, examinations etc. Notification/ letters are circulated to Institution if any change added in the Institutional academic process. Similarly if the Institution introduces new courses/ facilities, University constitutes the affiliation committee to inspect the details. These committees visit the Institution; inspect all required aspects about the running of new courses/faculties. The College honestly follows the recommendations suggested by these committees.

6.5.5 How is the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

In the case of Institution the external regulatory authority is Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad and we make the compliances as per their needs and the requirements of the Regional Joint Director (Higher Education) of the State Government and IQAC Cell of the affiliating university. The received grants are properly utilized by the college.

6.5.6 What Institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

At the beginning of every academic year the academic calendar is being prepared. The teaching learning process and other co- curricular programmes are being organized as per the plan. The IQAC with assistance to other departments monitors the teaching learning process. The process is being reviewed in meetings. The problems the faculties are confronting and sorted out in the meetings. The Institute's approach to the learning outcome assessment is defined clearly. The faculties are empowered to determine the intended educational outcomes of their academic programmes and activities. The discussion also takes place on the university level examination results. If necessary, the faculty is being advised to improve themselves in the desired area. Faculty uses the information collected to develop and improve academic programmes. The Institution has a clearly defined set mechanism to monitor the learning outcomes. Assignments are corrected within a short duration and the marks are entered in register which acts as a ready record

for academic progress of the students. An appropriate action is taken. Use of projector, enhances the teaching learning process and IQAC suggests changes if needed. Counseling is given to slow learners. Parents of such students are called to meet their respective faculty members, if required. They are also given additional time for practice. The faculty members are encouraged to conduct tests, quizzes etc. to monitor the academic progress of each student.

6.5.7 How does the Institution communicate its quality assurance policies mechanism and outcome to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The Institution communicate its quality assurance policies mechanism and outcome by forming different platforms like College Advisory Committee, Alumni and Parent Association, Parent teacher meet and various committees. The IQAC in the planning process considers feedback collected from the stakeholders to prepare perspective plan for future development. In addition to that, the prospectus also provides an opportunity have communication with the internal and external stakeholders. These developmental perspectives are discussed in the respective meetings of Co-ordination Committee. The reflections of the meetings minutes are incorporated in the plan.

CRITERIA VII

INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

The Institute has not conducted a Green Audit but is taking necessary steps to ensure a clean and healthy environment that aids effective learning and teaching. NSS department of the College has undertaken this drive. NSS volunteers take care of the campus. We protect and preserve the campus with keen observation.

7.1.2 What are the following initiatives taken by the College to make the campus eco-friendly?

• Energy Conservation:

The classrooms are naturally well lit that they hardly need any artificial lighting. The College has installed CFL's at the main places. This has helped a lot in conservation of electricity. We provide waste water to the plants and trees. To conserve the electricity the supply is switched off/unplugged for fans, lights, computers, printers and electrical equipments when not in use. There is provision of sufficient ventilation in each and every classroom, so use of fans, lights and artificial lights in the classrooms is limited. As there is sufficient numbers of windows for each classroom, the natural light is easily used by the students and teachers of the College.

• Plantation:

Plantation of trees is undertaken by the NSS department on the various occasions involving the guests and chief guests to plant the trees in the campus. The College organizes tree plantation program to inculcate this tradition among students. There are 600 trees of different varieties e.g. fruits, Mango, Neem etc. The planted trees in the campus are kept in growing condition and provided with the necessary water by using the water harvesting project in the College and in summer these trees are fed using waste water from nearby water purifying plant. The College has already begun a nursery of different saplings. The works are being undertaken in campus to strengthen the ground water sources for the College. More stress is laid on the long- term measures than the short term ones. Environment awareness is being created among the students and people for judicious usage of water. The core team of the College supports in this work. The harvested water and waste water from the water purifying plant is used by the College through pipeline to each and every plant in order to conserve various plants and trees to make the campus green and healthy with the help of students and peons. NSS Committee takes care of all the plants in the College premises.

• Hazard waste / E- waste management:

The College has the system to dispel garbage in the College campus. The wastage of newspapers, parts of computer, electrical items and waste from science

laboratories is collected by employees and it is disposed to raw material shop. The **USE ME** dust- bins are kept everywhere in the campus; the dead leaves and the waste papers are not allowed to be put on fire. The leaves and small cheats of paper are used to be put in the tank which is used for plants and trees as fertilizer. The Institution always creates awareness about issues like pollution, conservation of natural resource, sustainable development among the student and the stakeholders. The Institution has taken steps to establish a bio project to recycle the waste material and scrap in the campus. The recycled material is to be used as the fertilizer to the trees and plants in the College campus.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning College.

- 1. Having vernacular medium students of the locality, students from labor class, farming society, backward sections are admitted- in the College. It is a challenge to our teachers to attract them towards curriculum. To enhance the teaching learning process our Institution provides the LCD projector, broadband internet facility and computer laboratory. The remedial method of teaching is used for needy students and extra classes are taken to bring the students to average level of learning.
- **2.** The College faculty members and non-teaching members give prizes to the meritorious students in different subjects. For the succession of these prizes the faculty members in the College contributes financially. The list of the prizes given by the faculty members to the students are as follows.

- **4.** The Competitive exam cell of the College organizes pre-police training camps for the aspirants in the region.
- **5.** Gandhi Research Foundation, Jalgaon's Classes and exams are conducted in the campus.
- **6.** The College has established a Nursery for the plantation and every student in the campus is promoted to get and plant a tree in the concerned region.
- 7. The Institution distributes Uniforms for the needy and poor students on the occasion of Independence Day.
- **8.** The Library provides the special facility for the school students to read books and magazines by submitting their Identity cards in the Library.
- **9. Career Oriented Course:** The Institution does not run any career oriented course but as the fact the Institution proposes to commence the career oriented courses in the College and a proposal is being submitted to the affiliating university to implement the same. Apart from this the College runs the Career and Counseling Cell which provides the proper guidance to the stakeholders about the employment opportunities and communicates them with the competitive successors.
- **10. Question Bank:** Another innovation is of preparing question bank which helps to remove the burden of students as well as it helps to improve success rate in the University examination.
- 11. Feedback Mechanism: Students give the feedback about the teachers at the end of session. Students of each subject are expected to give their feedback for all the teachers of their classes. Besides informal interaction between the students and subject teacher, instruction and guidance of the principal to the faculty members encouraged teaching quality. Teachers are encouraged by departmental head/Principal regarding various measures to improve subject understanding or teaching skills.
- 12. Institute always motivated faculty members to attend orientation/refresher, short term courses and other relevant courses to enhance the teaching learning process.
- **13.** Computerization of administrative Blocks: The College has through away the orthodox system of working in the office. The College administrative block has been fully computerized. The administrative staff has been given formal training to understand the technicalities pertaining to working on the technology.
- **14. Functioning of library:** Total carpet area of the Library is 1500 Sq. Ft. The central Library has 5191 books in regular stock. Our Library has reference-books,

some CDs and Cassettes. The Institute have subscribes 37 journals and 11 periodicals. All these books are available to the all stakeholders.

The College has made the Library fully opened for the students as well as for the learners and research scholars. The students are having facility of internet web browsing in the Library.

- 15. It has been a regular practice to the Principal to meet the students in the class room exclusively or informally outside classrooms. To get their informal feedback, the College controls the violent behavior, misbehavior in and outside the classrooms. The College also improves academic performance, infrastructural needs, and basic facilities.etc. This reflects the openness of our system. So that quality sustenance is possible.
- **16.** The Principal observers every action of the stakeholders, staff members, visitors, and trespassers. The College controls the violent behavior, misbehavior, sexual harassments, etc. in the classrooms and College campus with the help of various committees.

03. The context

Under this practice the sports discipline and Health Committee motivates students to participate in the summer coaching camp. Earlier there was no

motivation, awareness, interest, internal and external skills. In the area there is not leadership developed among the students to Increase the fitness, mental fitness and self confidence. The students are also motivated to participate in various sports activities arranged by our College and University.

04. The practice

Under this practice six teachers are appointed to operate coaching in this camp. Apart from this two participated students of the College benefitted from this summer camp. We have sports discipline and health committee to prepare the planning of the camp. In spite of this, the students from our College are motivated to participate in the intercollegiate, inter university, state and national level games.

05. Evidence of success

Through the motivation to the students for coaching camp our twenty one students were selected for university level. In Academic Year 2011-12 with the help of Physical Education Department nearby school's one student was selected for National Level in fencing which was held at Nashik. In the Academic Year 2012-13, three students were selected for university level competition those were Mr. Sharad Sarawade, Miss. Sunita Chate and Miss. Shaikh Ajmin Jaffar. In Academic year 2013-14 one student of the College was selected as constable at S. P. Office, Wardha. Apart from this so many students are benefitted from this camp.

In the academic year 2012-13 twenty one students were participated and benefitted. In the academic year 2013-14 Eighty five students were participated and benefitted. In the academic year 2014-15 One hundred and forty students have participated and benefitted out of them fifty were girls and ninety boys. In Academic Year 2013-14, Mr. Piraji Kusale, Miss. Ayodhya Daund, Miss. Radha Bhosale have participated in the various events. In Academic Year 2014-15 two students were participated in Inter University level games held at Patiyala. (Mr. Piraji Kusale and Miss. Priyanka Misal)

In order to make the students active in sports as well as in the walks of life this camp is promoted. The aim of the summer camp is to motivate students in the sports activities. It is supervised by ex players of the town. This innovative coaching and practice enhance the student's quality in their life. Students are very competitive in sports activities. This camp provides opportunity to develop themselves as players, well nourished human beings and gain physical and mental fitness.

3. The context

Such instructions are given by the parent university.

5. Evidence of success

We are creating cultural atmosphere in this area. One of the participants has occupied highest position at international level, above all our Institution getting involved in this festival to get the fruitful results from the open stage festival. 6. Problems encountered and resource required

For success of any work students and parents had to devote more time than it required. Right now the process is very smooth and time saving. It created good impression of the Institute at local level. The College contains students from labor class, farming society and they are not aware about the higher education. They feel that once failed means end of their educational life. So such students were facing a lot of problems in studies. 35. SWOC analysis of the department and Future plans

Strength – The head of the department Prof Tudme J.V, wherein he urges the villagers to send their ward for higher education and opt particularly English subject for their bright future. This resulted in having more enrollments for English as optional subject. For facilitating English language teaching, the department use modern latest technological audio visual aids, Power Point Device like LCD projector to enhance teaching learning process. Some of our department's Alumni are appointed as an Asst. Professors, Jr. Lecturers, teachers and Journalist.

Weaknesses – Since the College is located in educationally backward area, the students admitted in the department are from the medium of Marathi who fears to study English as one of the optional subjects. The reason behind this is that till 12th STD, the subject is not being taught seriously in most of the junior Colleges in the vicinity. They are not very good at basics of language and literature. Hence, they have developed inferiority complex among them that played a great hindrance in the progress of the department. This resulted in having fewer enrollments as compared to other subjects.

Opportunities – We teach students most of them are preparing for competitive examinations like staff selection, MPSC, etc where the knowledge of English language is desirable. We have opportunity to improve the stakeholders' competence of English through curricular and extra-curricular activities. The department has opportunity to wipe out the fear about English language among students and develop interest so that they may not hesitate to take English as one of the optional subjects. We are created research aptitude in the mind of the students with the help of Flight wallpapers. To provide platform for the writing skill developed and encouraged by the various activities of the department.

Challenges – Students are weak at the level of the pronunciation as well as understanding of the English language. They are not able to write, read and speak English properly. The students of this region are from the Marathi medium Colleges and they have Marathi as their mother tongue. Therefore, in such circumstances to teach them to acquire the four basic skills i.e. LRWS (listening, reading, writing and speaking) is the big challenge.






